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Gladys Watt of the **Loudwater book club** shares some recommendations...

"Our book club is not affiliated to the LRA although all our members live in Loudwater. We just have friendly informal meetings once a month and read a wide variety of books. Below is a selection of titles that we have enjoyed.

Mothering Sunday by Graham Swift - A moving romance with believable characters. The books' lead character Jane has worked as a maid at an English country house since she was sixteen. For almost all of those years she has been the secret lover of the young heir of a neighbouring house. The story moves back and forth from 1924 to the end of the century and is one of profound self-discovery.

The Island by Victoria Hislop - A very moving novel and, we felt, the best of her books, all of which show her knowledge of the history of the Greek islands. The story centres on Alexis, who is on the brink of a life-changing decision. She longs to find out about her mother's past, but Sofia has never spoken of it. All she admits to is growing up in a small Cretan village before moving to London. When Alexis decides to visit Crete, Sofia gives her daughter a letter to take to an old friend and promises that through her she will learn more...

The Crimson Rooms by Katherine
McMahon - This local author has given us
a very good read with interesting
characters. Living at home with her
mother, aunt, and grandmother, Evelyn is
still haunted by the death of her younger

brother James in the First World War. She is also determined to make a career for herself as one of the first female lawyers. So, when the doorbell rings late one night and a woman appears, claiming to have mothered James's child, her world is turned upside down.

Educated by Tara Westover - This is an amazing true story and a fascinating read. The characters led to much discussion. Tara Westover was 17 the first time she set foot in a classroom. Born to survivalists in the mountains of Idaho, the family was so isolated from mainstream society that there was no one to ensure the children received an education. Tara began to educate herself, ultimately getting to university. Her quest for knowledge transformed her, taking her to both Harvard and overseas to Cambridge. Only then would she wonder if she'd travelled too far, if there was still a way home.

Normal People by Sally Rooney - This is a sad, moving story which leads the reader through a range of emotions. At school Connell and Marianne pretend not to know each other. He's a popular star of the school soccer team while she is lonely, proud, and intensely private. But when Connell comes to pick his mother up from her housekeeping job at Marianne's house, a strange and indelible connection grows between the two teenagers, one they are determined to conceal.

An American Marriage by Tayari Jones - Cleverly written and keeps the reader interested throughout. The ending was not predicted! Newlyweds Celestial and Roy are the embodiment of the American dream. He is a young executive, and she is an artist on the brink of an exciting career. Until one day they are ripped apart by circumstances neither could have imagined. Roy is arrested and sentenced to twelve years for a crime Celestial knows he didn't commit...

Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng -An easy read which poses questions on family relationships. The story explores the weight of long-held secrets and the ferocious pull of motherhood, and the danger of believing that planning and following the rules can avert disaster, or heartbreak.

Further easy-read holiday page turners are psychological thriller 'Anything You Do Say' by Gillian McAllister and crime story 'Close to Home' by Cara Hunter. True stories 'The Tattooist of Auschwitz' by Heather Morris and 'The Narrow Road to the Deep North' by Richard Flanagan are also extremely moving."



Charity plant sale

Our membership secretary Roger Trigg and his wife Patt are holding a plant sale in aid of the National Gardens Scheme (NGS) charities of which Macmillan is the major beneficiary. The sale will take place on Saturday and Sunday, May 16th & 17th in their garden at 7 Armitage Close (WD3 4HL) from 10.00am to 12 noon both days. Coffee will be available.

Tackling asbestos on path 34

We are very lucky in Loudwater, being located in the middle of beautiful countryside with numerous footpaths. Maintenance of many of them is the responsibility of Herts County Council (HCC) and one such footpath is number 34 which runs from the end of Chess Lane down the Chess Valley towards Rickmansworth. It passes through land that is owned by the Royal Masonic School (RMS). On the southern side it is bordered by a hedge, brush and woods, and on the northern side there are fields which are tenanted by a farmer.

Part way along the path there has been an issue with an asbestos cement contamination for many years. There have been broken pieces of this asbestos sitting on the surface along a 70m length of the path and it appears to originate from the

adjacent field. Many footpaths were historically constructed using asbestos cement debris as hard core to shore them up, but this is not the case along this footpath.

Each time the field is ploughed more asbestos is brought to the surface and broken up by the force of the plough, and it eventually migrates down the field ending up on the path. After many years of discussion with Three Rivers District Council who were reluctant to take any action, HCC decided the situation warranted their attention and undertook significant works along the affected stretch of footpath in the summer of 2019.

Initially they tested the material to confirm that it was indeed asbestos, and once this had been confirmed they excavated a 160m stretch of the path removing what asbestos they found, installed a membrane preventing any further asbestos from rising to the surface, reinstated the footpath and also constructed a soil bund on the northern side of the path to prevent any further asbestos contamination getting onto the path from the field.

HCC did an excellent job and to date no further asbestos has been seen on the path, although there is still plenty in the field with small piles now resting up against the bund. Since HCC completed the work, I have been in discussion with a representative for the RMS about dealing with the remaining asbestos contamination. This work cannot be undertaken by HCC as the contamination is on private land. I am hopeful that progress will be made in the coming months and will report back to residents in due course.

How did you celebrate your 40th birthday?



Most may respond by having a party or a nice meal but recent Loudwater resident, Veronika Chagonda Reid celebrated her 40th by raising over £11,000 for charity!

Veronika was born and brought up in Zimbabwe until she was 18 when she moved to the UK where she has lived ever since. She recently set up a charity, the RASA Schools Foundation to raise money to rebuild a primary school in Gutu, Zimbabwe, which was devastated by storms back in February last year. Veronika attended the school so the charity is very close to her heart and those of many of her friends who are local families.

Not only did classrooms and teachers' homes have their roofs blown off, there was severe water damage to the children's books, furniture and teachers' belongings. Furthermore, children were in class during the storm and sadly, seven of them were injured and needed hospital treatment.

To raise funds for the foundation, to help rebuild the school, she decided to orgainise a ball which coincided with her birthday. The 'Out of Africa' ball was held on 23rd November at Latimer House with over 150 guests, African dancing and music for entertainment, as well as a lively auction which raised over £4,000.

"Veronika is such a kind, warm person who is very well thought of in the community, everyone wanted to help her raise funds for such a good cause. A highlight of the ball was a video of the local children singing a song dedicated to the children of Christ Church (where her children go)" said friend Lisa Marheineke.

Veronika is married to local man Simon Reid and has two little girls who attend Christ Church school and they now live in Chorleywood but were living in Bridle Lane in Loudwater at the time of the ball. They are regular attendees of Christ Church in Chorleywood who also supported her with her fund raising.

Veronika said "Our aim is to ensure that the foundations of education are provided to help prepare young people in Rasa. Plus making sure the children have access to clean water by providing fresh water bore holes as well as sanitation. Getting together my friends and family to support the school and village where I was brought up was the most amazing feeling but also rather humbling. The generosity of my friends was overwhelming and the money raised will go such a long way back home."

- Tournament entrance fees



Green Belt development

In his latest article LRA Planning Secretary, Mike Sindic, considers the future of the Green Belt, and shares his views on its development.



I have always been slightly sceptical as to whether protests about a locality being 'Green Belt' land represent a genuine concern, or whether a more accurate interpretation is "I don't want anybody to change anything, but if I do it doesn't matter".

Firstly a few facts:

- The London Green Belt, in common with other green belts, was established to prevent coalescence, urban sprawl and extended uncontrolled development.
- The London Green Belt is 4,047,367 acres.
- It must be understood that the whole of the Three Rivers District Council area is in the Green Belt including all towns, villages, settlements, etc.
- The area of TRDC is 22,210 acres, and theoretically even if the whole of this area were to be concreted over, it would represent a loss of only a tiny fraction of the Green Belt.

While the Green Belt is intended to "prevent urban sprawl, coalescence and encroachment of the countryside, encourage the preservation of historic towns, and to assist urban regeneration ie recycling of derelict and other urban land" (National Planning Policy Framework 134), certain activities are permitted. These include buildings for agriculture and forestry, facilities for sport and recreation, cemeteries and burial grounds, allotments, extensions and alterations to buildings unless disproportionate to the existing, replacement of buildings in the same use as long as these are not larger, limited infilling, limited affordable housing, and limited infill or partial/complete redevelopment of previously developed land (NPPF 145). Other activities which are allowed but not relevant to Loudwater, include mineral extraction, engineering operations, etc (NPPF 146).

The majority (if not all) of the objections to any development in the Green Belt appear to be directed to encroachment of the countryside or agricultural land, and most of the objectors do not have access to this land other than perhaps the use of footpaths crossing agricultural land. Commons, parks and other open land owned and managed by the Local Authority are rarely at risk. Access to open land is not critical for the benefits that such land provides which include animal and bird habitats, biodiversity, visual amenity etc. However, there appears to be very little concern regarding the most common of the permitted activities which are extensions and alterations to buildings. Almost every extension, outbuilding, patio, paved driveway, decking, etc takes away a small portion of the "green" element of a residential plot. Gardens and open spaces around buildings are just as important as countryside and other open land, and garden areas are being eroded at a steady rate by the proliferation of small residential developments.

For example, I have taken one week at random from the Council's Planning lists for December, and calculated the approximate area of gardens that will be lost if all proposed extensions were granted permission to be approximately 65,520 square metres (1.5 acres) excluding drives, patios, parking areas, etc. Adding an approximate value for these, it is not inconceivable that some two acres of

'green' garden areas could be lost from one week's application, giving a possible



annual total of 100 acres per year. I would suggest that this represents a far greater potential loss than is likely to be due to potential developments on open Green Belt land. It will be interesting to see which sites are selected when TRDC eventually produce the final draft for the new Local Plan. It is inevitable that at least some sites will involve development on open land, but these are unlikely to affect Loudwater.

Is the future of Green Belts bleak? Yes, I think that it is. One of the more controversial proposals to help ease the UK's housing crisis is to relax the controls that limit building activity on protected Green Belt land. The Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors undertook an informal survey of their membership "On what terms would you build on the Green Belt?" with the following surprising results:

- 39% redeveloping old sites
- 25% if homes are eco-friendly
- 23% absolutely none
- 13% any development, the rule is outdated

Of course this is not a formal survey, but if the Government were to seek the opinion of the relevant professional bodies such as architects, town planners, and engineers, with a view to changing or amending the legislation, only a minority would be in favour of the rules relating to Green Belts being retained. (Incidentally and before anybody asks, I am in the 13% category!).
