Chairman's words





Saying farewell to Mike Sindic



For some years now page 7 of the Ol' Trout has been the domain of LRA Planning Secretary, Mike Sindic. He has generously shared all manner of insights from his professional career as a building surveyor, guiding residents on topics as wide ranging as Japanese knot weed and what to be mindful of living in a conservation area, highlighting the rise of property fraud and outlining how to effectively object to a planning application. Mike has been an extremely knowledgeable and valuable resource, helping countless neighbours.

However, back in March both Mike and his wife Linda succumbed to the Coronavirus, and in early April Mike sadly died. Linda had the virus more mildly and has recovered but obviously continues to face a difficult time adjusting to life without Mike.

Mike will also be hugely missed by those of us on the LRA committee, neighbours and friends. He was a great and endlessly cheerful friend, always quick to lend his support and encouragement to whatever initiative we were working on. He was particularly passionate about planning and loved chatting about the intricacies of associated issues and case law. He was enormously good fun and full of banter.

His greatest passion, however, was his family. He spoke often, and with great affection, of his children and grandchildren and loved the time he got to spend with them.

Mike also loved to travel with Linda, and typically had a succession of trips lined up at any one time.

Linda has kindly shared with us a bit about the remarkable life he had: "Mike was born in Serbia in November 1944 and moved to the UK at the age of nine. His father, along with many of his fellow compatriots, had to leave what was then Yugoslavia a few weeks before Mike was born due to political reasons. He ended up joining up with the British Army in Italy and came to England towards the end of the war. It took him nine years to trace his family and get them out of communist Yugoslavia to join him in England. They finally arrived in the summer of 1954. Mike was immediately enrolled in Primary School, not speaking a word of English, but went on to pass the 11+ and go on to Grammar School. He subsequently made a career as a Building Surveyor working for many years in Local Government. In the early 1990s he left the London Borough of Camden to set up his own business as a Surveyor specialising in Party Wall Awards and Rights of Light. The business went on to become very successful and Mike finally retired in 2012 but carried on working in a part time capacity as a consultant for another Building Surveying Practice.

Mike and Linda moved to the outskirts of Loudwater in 1994 and then moved down into Loudwater itself in 2013."

It's fair to say that he leaves quite a legacy and will be sadly missed.
