Fibre Broadband Rickmansworth Cabinet 10

At the end of last year, David Gauke MP received a reply from Openreach, in response to a constituent's query, stating that this cabinet had once again been withdrawn from Openreach's commercial programme. I therefore made enquiries with BT's Major Complaints Department to ascertain why this had occurred. The response was most encouraging stating that the cabinet was still in Openreach's programme and still on schedule to provide fibre broadband in Spring 2017.

Openreach has no obligation to tell local authorities if it withdraws a cabinet for commercial/technical reasons. However Cabinet 10 is known to be "politically sensitive" and Openreach will flag up internally with BT if there is any risk of it being withdrawn or delayed.

On this basis, I am told by BT that "no news is good news"!

Red Kites

In recent articles of the Ol'Trout Red Kites have been featured. Red Kites have been seen in Loudwater in recent years and the numbers are growing. It appears they are becoming a problem in Loudwater due to some local residents feeding the Red Kites. Due to this local feeding around Trout Rise area there is a large group of Red Kites; over 20 have been counted in the sky. The abundance of food drives the numbers of birds in a particular area.

The number of birds appears to be causing a problem for some residents of Loudwater. The birds are dropping chicken bones into gardens and swimming pools, kites swooping low and soiling of residents windows/cars, etc simply because their neighbour chooses to feed the kites. Also the noise made by such a large flock of birds has become a nuisance.



In the Chilterns, there is no conservation reason to provide additional food for the kites as enough natural food is available, and has been for more than 20 years, to sustain a naturally healthy population of kites.

It is best that these birds fend for themselves. Please do not feed the Red Kites with chicken pieces.

Background

Red kites were driven to extinction in England by human persecution by the end of the nineteenth century. A small population survived in Wales, but there was little chance of these birds repopulating their original areas.

Between 1989 and 1994, kites from Spain were imported and released into the Chilterns by the RSPB and English Nature (now Natural England). Red kites started breeding in the Chilterns in 1992 and now there could be over 1,000 breeding pairs in the area. The reintroduction has been so successful it is not possible to monitor all the nests, so the overall size of the population can only be estimated.

Since 1999, chicks have been taken from the Chilterns to reintroduction sites in other parts of the country. The red kite reintroduction has proved to be one of the greatest conservation success stories of the 20th century.

In March, kites begin to spend more time in potential nesting areas. They will use nests abandoned by other birds, or will build their own in tall trees. The nests are made from large sticks and are normally lined with wool, which the birds collect along with other unusual items such as pieces of plastic and sometimes even items of clothing.

By mid-April the female lays up to four white eggs, flecked with light brown, of which one to three usually hatch after 34 days. The young birds fledge in about six to seven weeks and will remain with their parents for a further week to ten days.

Red kites mainly scavenge on dead animals, but are opportunistic hunters, capable of killing small animals. They will feed on chicks, small mammals and invertebrates such as beetles and earthworms.

The belief that kites killed lambs and gamebirds led to their widespread persecution in the past. Although they do not habitually prey on larger animals or birds, isolated reports of them attempting to take larger live prey such as rabbits, squirrels, chickens and partridges have been received. They will thrive on dead lambs and pheasants.

A kite's territory varies depending on the abundance of food. Where food is plentiful, large numbers of kites can be found living together.

Red kites are protected at all times. It is illegal to disturb the birds while they are nesting or at any other time.

Metropolitan line extension

In order to prepare for the new viaduct over Baldwins Lane substantial utilities work needs to take place in and around Baldwins Lane and A412 Watford Road. This will be undertaken in phases from Saturday 27th February 2016 for up to six months, as the various utility companies complete their work.

The first phase will take place from Saturday 27th February until Sunday 27th March 2016.

The work involves excavating areas of the carriageway and footways in order to divert existing water, gas, electric and communications services.

The majority of work will take place between 0800hrs and 1800hrs from Monday to Sunday. Traffic management will only be on the carriageway during the following times:

Weekdays (from 9.30am to 4pm) and weekends (all day): Single eastbound lane closure on the Watford Road roundabout and Baldwins Lane approach and Watford Road exit.

Weekdays (from 9.30am to 4pm): Single lane working on Baldwins Lane managed by stop/go signage.

As part of the work they will need to suspend parking on the eastbound carriageway of Baldwins Lane, along with the closure of the footway.

They are expecting to undertake night-time works on Wednesday 9 March 2016 just outside the entrance to Cinnamond House at the Watford Road roundabout.

The work is still subject to final approvals from Hertfordshire County Council Highways.

Since mid-January we have undertaken some selective tree clearance along the disused corridor and in the location of the new viaduct. From Monday 29th February, for three weeks, we plan that work will be focused on removing the trees on the railway embankment either side of Baldwins Lane.

Station Road Bridge Works Reminder

The new bridge sections are being constructed on the building site in Victoria Close. The new sections will then be transported across the road at Easter.

There will be road and rail disruption over Easter weekend, 25th to 29th March whilst the construction is being completed.
