The role of the Loudwater Residents Association (LRA)


There is often some confusion about the role of the LRA. From time-to-time local residents get our remit muddled with the responsibilities of the boards of some of the Loudwater private estates and roads. So, to help clarify, below is an overview of our purpose and focus.

The Loudwater Residents' Association (LRA) was formed in 1949 by householders on the Loudwater Estate. The LRA reformed in 1957 and expanded to include adjoining private estates and neighbouring roads and lanes as shown.

The aims of the LRA are:

- a. To provide a focal group for the residents of Loudwater to deal collectively and effectively with matters that affect Loudwater.
- b. To provide a focus for community activities and other events for residents of Loudwater. This includes all activities encouraging friendship and neighbourliness.
- c. To keep the residents of Loudwater informed of events and matters of local interest through the The Ol' Trout.
- d. To provide a lobby group to encourage Three Rivers District Council and Hertfordshire County Council to maintain and improve the various publicly owned lanes and verges within Loudwater. This includes action to discourage through traffic and to ensure safety on Loudwater roads.
- e. To help maintain and protect the covenants for Loudwater (Troutstream) Estate Ltd, Bridle Lane Estates Ltd, Lower Plantation (and other private estates), in the best interests of their residents.

Walking on Loudwater roads

Now that so many of us are taking advantage of the neighbourhood roads for our exercise, one of our members has highlighted that, by and large, it is safer to walk on the right-hand side of the road and face oncoming traffic.

There are a few places where it is obviously wiser to cross to the left-hand side (and common sense should always prevail!) but, in general, the best practice rule is 'face oncoming traffic'.

Loudwater pulls out the stops for new charity

"We couldn't have done it without you."

Chorleywood's new charity **Mission EmployAble** has asked the Ol' Trout to thank Loudwater residents for your help with their fund-raising.

Before Covid (remember those days?) Mission EmployAble launched a joint campaign with Chorleywood Cricket Club to raise money for a new club pavilion on the Common, with a café and gift shop inside, and a training facility for young adults with learning disabilities.

Loudwater resident **Philip Garner** is a trustee of the charity and **Erica Bendall** was appointed chair of the local fundraising committee; her brief is to help raise the £2m required for the new pavilion, cafe and training space.

During lockdown, most fund-raising activities were either cancelled or postponed. Others were run 'virtually', including Mission WoofAble, an online dog show attracting some 250 photo entries and judged by **Shirlie Kemp**.

Loudwater locals scooped five prizes:

Ann Garner with Yoda: Handsome Hound and Best in Show

Celia Brothers with Alaska: Best Friend

Roger Cattell with Ayra: Doggy Diva

Jennifer McDermott with Voldermort and Rupert (gone but not forgotten).

We pulled out the stops again at Christmas:

Lisa Marheineke won the wreath competition, Doors For The Cause.

Sophia Oakton wrapped 2000 Mission EmployAble Christmas cards into bundles of 10.

In September, several of us tuned in for the charity's Virtual Comedy Night.

Pandemic-permitting, Mission EmployAble is planning various fundraising activities for 2021 and once again, Loudwater will be well represented:

- Golf Day on 16 April: Pete
 Higgins and Roger Cattell have
 signed up two Four Balls
 (places are still available)
- Team CoastBusters Cycle Ride to Padstow on May 23: Tony Bendall and three mates (including Adrian Horsburgh who grew up in Loudwater) get on their bikes.

The efforts of Erica and her local fundraising team have managed to raise a staggering £25,000, despite lockdown. Other funding has come from charitable trusts, foundations and personal pledges.

The Cricket club and Mission EmployAble still have approximately £300,000 of the £2m to raise. The new pavilion will replace the dilapidated 1960s building and will enable the Cricket Club to extend its coaching programmes to girls, women and people with disabilities, when it is completed in late 2021/early 2022.

Inside, the Mission EmployAble café (which does not yet have a name) will serve homemade snacks, lunches and afternoon teas, seven days a week.

Philip Garner said, "Anyone - from cricket fans and parents with young children to dog walkers, ramblers and groups - will be able to walk to the café and enjoy the fabulous views across the Common."

Uniquely, the food will be prepared and served by young interns with learning disabilities, under the supervision of skilled trainers.

Each will spend a year with Mission EmployAble as an intern, obtaining employability skills in association with the Bucks College Group.

Thank you again to all the Loudwater residents who have helped the charity so far.

Financial scams

A few weeks ago, we were contacted by a relation of an elderly couple who had until recently been LRA members, living on the Chorleywood Road, but had sadly passed away. Both had been in ill health for some years, which had led to them being quite vulnerable. She shared with me the distress that her family had experienced on discovering that the couple had been the victims of financial scammers, who had tricked them into giving them access to their considerable life savings and 'cleared out' their accounts. She was understandably extremely upset and angry about the injustice of what had taken place and asked that we consider highlighting the issue with residents.

During the pandemic financial scams have been on the rise. News reports have shared horrifying stories of ruthless criminals taking advantage of people during this difficult time. The National Crime Agency advise that "Law enforcement, government and private sectors partners are working together to encourage members of the public to be more vigilant against fraud, particularly about sharing their financial and personal information, as criminals seek to capitalise on the Covid-19 pandemic." They offer the following guidance:

Stop: Taking a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

Challenge: Could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

Protect: Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud.

While no one is immune to being targeted, the elderly are particularly vulnerable. Charity AgeUK provide some really helpful advice on their website, including guidance about what to do if you're worried that someone you know

is being scammed. You can read their information at:

Broadband update

About two years ago BT Openreach completed a programme of Fibre to the Premise (FTTP) for 90% of those residents living on the Loudwater (Troutstream) Estate. Once installed, if desired, it was then up to each household to take-up the option and have the fibre connection linked from the telegraph pole to their home. Robert Kenison and the Troutstream Estate Board began working with BT Openreach back in 2016 to upgrade the performance of broadband across the estate and many residents have since taken up having it.

Back in January, Andy Coteman was in touch to flag that BT Openreach were now installing FTTP throughout WD3. It had originally been due in Q4 2020, although it has understandably been delayed. He has been advised that Openreach plan to have all the engineering complete by the end of Q3 2021, and that each house that wants it, will need to be visited by an engineer who will install a small fibre box which will be connected to their normal router.

Given that Loudwater is quite sparsely populated compared with other areas in WD3 it's encouraging that BT are doing all the engineering work. As at late January, Andy noted that they had surveyed Chess Hill and Lane and work appeared to be underway on Loudwater Drive.

So, despite lockdown, fingers crossed faster more reliable Broadband will be available right across the neighbourhood soon.

Local rapid coronavirus test centres

According to the government, 1 in 3 people with Covid-19 don't show any symptoms, so rapid testing is a quick way to find out if you're infectious. Several rapid coronavirus testing centres have recently opened across Hertfordshire for people with no symptoms of the disease. The councilrun sites offer free lateral flow tests which can detect whether someone has Covid within minutes. Anyone taking a lateral flow test should receive a test result within one hour of taking the test.

This type of testing is **primarily intended for key workers** who are unable to work from home, but the testing is open to the community as well.

Anyone with any of the three main Covid symptoms however, **must not** use a rapid testing site - instead they should book a test via the government website at an existing coronavirus testing site or by booking a home test.

How do I get a rapid test?

Since late January, Hertfordshire
County Council has opened a number
of testing sites including in
Rickmansworth, Watford, Bushey and
Abbots Langley. An appointment for a
rapid test must be booked online via
the council's website – you can choose
a time slot to visit on a day the testing
site is open.

What happens at the testing centre?

A swab is taken from a person's throat and nose. At some test centres, you'll need to swab your own throat and nose with supervision from a trained professional. At other centres, a trained professional will carry out the swab.

Once the test is complete, you must return home. You'll receive an email or text confirming your test result within one hour. Public transport should be avoided to travel to or from a rapid testing site and a face covering must be worn at the testing centre, except when taking the test.

To reiterate, this service is primarily for key workers – however, if you are particularly concerned about your health, you may wish to consider having a test.

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
