
The Local Plan

I am sure most people are aware that housing targets, and the 'Local Plan' to accommodate these, have been bubbling away for some time. Mike Sindic produced a few articles in previous Ol' Trout's covering the key issues, but the headline figure of a housing target of 9,600 new dwellings in the district by 2036, increasing the number of people living here by about a quarter, with an already overstretched road, rail, healthcare and education infrastructure, is the one I assume most residents will be familiar with.

The target resulted in Three Rivers District Council (TRDC) commencing a search for sites which led to around 130 sites being put forward. A high proportion of these are currently Greenbelt, unspoilt land which has enjoyed protection since 1947. It is thought that TRDC's new plan being put forward for public consultation shortly after May's elections, will be heavily based on these sites and will be available to view on their website.

There are many differences of opinion about the actual number of new dwellings required over the fifteen-year period covered by the Plan. Whilst Brownfield areas should be utilised wherever possible there is significant risk that Greenbelt land could be utilised for new developments and some of these areas are to the south, east and north of Loudwater.

As a result of the referendum that accompanied the recent local elections, the Chorleywood Neighbourhood Plan is being adopted into the Local Plan (almost 90% voted in favour). However, the Neighbourhood Plan only goes so far in designating green spaces and protecting existing Greenbelt. Whilst there is an inevitability that more



housing will ultimately be built in the future, the existing local infrastructure will not be able to cope - factors such as the local roads, increased competition for school places, access to healthcare, recreation, commuting capacity into London etc, are all concerns.

One thing is for sure, the Local Plan will continue to rumble on. I'd suggest residents keep abreast of developments and take time to review TRDC's new plan that should be open for public consultation soon, and make their views known to TRDC during the consultation period to help shape the future of the area.

In the last Ol' Trout we profiled Mission EmployAble – a local charity that has launched a joint campaign with Chorleywood Cricket Club to raise money for a new club pavilion on the Common, with a café and gift shop inside, and a training facility for young adults with learning disabilities.

Their fundraising efforts continue, and most recently this included the opportunity to enjoy the seasonal bluebells. Erica Bendall, Chair of their Event Committee shared with us...

"Our Bluebell Walk on Sunday 2nd and Monday 3rd May proved to be an absolute delight and a triumph for Mission EmployAble volunteers and visitors alike, with just under £4,000 raised from the two days - double what we were hoping for – and ended with a promise for another Bluebell Walk in 2022. We were lucky with the weather and most of all, with the stunning carpet of bluebells in the woods, which

one visitor described as: "quite magical, I had a real sense of people coming alive after a long hibernation, happy families enjoying the privilege of a new place to explore and a fun popup café." It was wonderful to see Loudwater residents joining in the fun. Following the message that popped up on the Troutstream Estate Whatsapp group on the Sunday, the number of visitors doubled on Monday. It was great to see so many local faces smiling on their way out of the woods after spending a lovely couple of hours just being amongst this tranquil setting that has never been open to the public before."

Ann Garner from Greenbanks, Melissa Fabio from Tara and Maureen Bayliss from Trees, all helped out at the event (see photo above). Victoria Michaels from The Thatch also baked cakes, as did Ann Oakton - her chocolate and strawberry cake was a real showstopper!

Summer reads

As we edge towards summer and start to daydream about the possibility of a break away in the sunshine (whether UK based or - dare we hope - abroad), the LRA committee thought we'd share a few recommendations for summer reads. And since the Chorleywood Bookshop have recently moved into a new, more spacious premises in the village - they might provide an excuse to go and check out their great new shop. Below are a few titles that could appeal to a range of reading tastes. The first three are all No.1 Sunday Times bestsellers (and it's probably just a matter of time for Dermot too!).

The Thursday Murder Club – this is the debut novel by 'Pointless' and 'House of Games' host, Richard Osman. The story is set in a peaceful retirement village, where four unlikely friends meet up once a week to investigate unsolved murders. But when a brutal killing takes place on their very doorstep, the Thursday Murder Club find themselves in the middle of their first live case.

Elizabeth, Joyce, Ibrahim and Ron might be pushing eighty but they still have a few tricks up their sleeves. Can our unorthodox but brilliant gang catch the killer before it's too late?

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig — this book is described as a worldwide phenomenon! The concept of the story is thought provoking and uplifting:









Between life and death there is a library, and within that library, the shelves go on forever. Every book provides a chance to try another life you could have lived. To see how things would be if you had made other choices . . . Would you have done anything different, if you had the chance to undo your regrets?

The Guest List by Lucy Foley - On an island off the coast of Ireland, guests gather to celebrate two people joining their lives together as one. The groom: handsome and charming, a rising television star. The bride: smart and ambitious, a magazine publisher. It's a wedding for a magazine, or for a celebrity: the designer dress, the remote location, the luxe party favors, the boutique whiskey. The cell phone service may be spotty and the waves may be rough, but every detail has been expertly planned and will be expertly executed.

But perfection is for plans, and people are all too human. As the champagne is popped and the festivities begin, resentments and petty jealousies begin to mingle with the reminiscences and well wishes. The groomsmen begin the drinking game from their school days. The bridesmaid not-so-accidentally ruins her dress. The bride's oldest (male) friend gives an uncomfortably caring toast.

And then someone turns up dead. Who didn't wish the happy couple well? And perhaps more importantly, why?

Toto the Ninja Cat and the Mystery Jewel Thief by Dermot O'Leary – this is one for the youngsters! TV and radio presenter Dermot is also an accomplished children's author and recently took part in an online event with Chorleywood Bookshop to promote Toto's latest adventure:

"Toto and her friends are in trouble! The animal world's spectacular crown jewels are kept under lock and key at the Tower of London. But when Toto goes to visit them, they're stolen from right under her whiskers – and her boss Larry (the Downing Street cat) is framed for the crime!

Will Toto and her friends be able to solve the mystery and track down the real thief?

This book is beautifully illustrated by Nick East. A fun read for children aged around 8 – especially if they like cats!
